# Annual Report on NGO database monitoring and evaluation of NGOs working in HPNSP sector in Bangladesh.

Reporting Period: August 2020 till April 2021

#### Background

Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MoHFW) acknowledges the vital role of NGOs in the development of the country's Health, Population and Nutrition (HPN) sector. In order to implement its health policy and achieve universal health coverage, the government needs a clearer view on geographical coverage and the service area of the NGOs. It is also important to understand how NGOs coordinate with MOHFW at national and regional levels.

Gender, NGO, and Stakeholder Participation Unit (GNSPU) represents MoHFW to coordinate with the stakeholders in HPN sector and facilitate the participation of NGOs. On this purview GNSPU is mandated by MoHFW to decide on the initial approval of NGOs expressing interest to work in this field.

GNSPU with technical assistance from UNICEF, has developed a database on national and international NGOs working in the HPN sector with foreign funds. Such database can enable the MoHFW to identify the geographic distribution of NGOs and their activities in each area. With this information, MOHFW aims to improve its capability for identifying gaps in service coverage, recommend on avoiding duplication and define ways of collaboration.

### Core objective

To gather and review data on the NGOs in health sector to prepare monthly report.

#### Specific objectives

- 1. To collect information on all proposed activities by NGOs in health sector
- 2. To determine relevance with health service delivery
- 3. To provide input on quality of service
- 4. To minimize duplication in the services

## Supervision, monitoring and Oversight strategy using the database

A committee has been formed with Director General, Health Economics Unit (HEU) in the chair and comprised of GNSPU team, representatives from NGO Affairs bureau, DGHS and DGFP. The committee holds meeting in each month to review the applications sent by NGO affairs bureau approval from GNSPU, Health Economics Unit based on the relevance, outcome and output. The applications are sorted by the NGO affairs bureau to identify health sector projects and then they are sent to GNSPU for the opinion.

During the meeting, the technical committee at HEU reviews the application in light with the details objectives set forth earlier. The approval is granted as both conditional and unconditional. The conditional approval refers to advising on resubmission with further clarity on national priority, outcome, and output as well as close collaboration with health and administrative personnel at districts

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and further. Also, there were some applications which were not related to health services delivery and therefore not reviewed and returned as it came.






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#### Future Challenges and way out

Honorarium for the committee members: Unlike all other government meeting procedures, there has been no provision of honorarium for the members of the committee. Some of the members have to travel from other parts of the city to attend meeting at Health Economics Unit Conference room located in one of most congested part of the city. Therefore it is essential to create provision in order to avoid demotivation of the members in future.

**Obligatory compliance for the GNSPU opinion**: The current compliance for NGO affairs bureau for the GNSPU report is 15 days and if, for any procedural reason, the GNSPU opinion arrives after 15 days, it is granted the GNSPU has given positive opinion. This is considered as a least priority issue for the NGOs and therefore the NGOs are least bothered about having GNSPU opinion. Given this, there must be an enhanced obligatory compliance in place which will elevate the priority of this meeting.

It involves explorative studies, surveys, researches to identify potential scopes, opportunities and challenges in collaboration in health sector. The need of such strategy in health care is central to carry forward government plans to improve access and utilization of services both at central and local level. It is also crucial to harmonise activities among the key public and private sector stakeholders.
